Job Description:	<p>CNC Technicians are machinists with additional skills in programming, setup and operating computer driven machine tools. Most high-tech products including computers, aircraft and medical devices use precision components made on CNC machine tools. After determining the best manufacturing strategies and selecting tools, a CNC program is developed. CAD/CAM (Computer Aided Design/Computer Aided Manufacturing) software is commonly used to assist in developing the CNC program.</p> <p>CNC Machine Types: Mill and Lathe. Lathe is a rotary process in which the tooling is stationary and the work moves. Milling machine is a linear process where the tool moves and the work stays stationary. Skill sets are transferable between mill and lathe machines.</p>
